



I'm sure everybody has heard this but if you haven't than I guess I'll be the first to break it to ya. The New Jersey power/ speed metal band HADES have broken wait a minute! Now I hear that they're back together. The only original member though is Ed Fuhrmon who was the ~ guitarist. Rounding out the new line-up is Henry Robinson on bass, Steve Cohen on drums, Mac McGovern on vocals and Mark Paris as the second guitarist. Meanwhile, Dan Lorenzo (guitar) has teamed up with other New Jersey musicians to start up NON FICTION. Alan Tecchio has gone on to become vocalist for WATCHTOWER..... Speaking of WATCHTOWER, they have signed a deal with Noise Records. Expect their new album to be out in the near future. Noise in the meantime has plans on rereleasing their first album.... The gods of progressive metal, CRIMSON GLORY, have signed a new deal with MCA Records. MCA is expected to re-release the bands Transcendence album along with an U.S. tour starting in October....ACE FREHLEY's new album, Trouble Walkin, is expected to be released in October on the Megaforce/ Atlantic label. Ex-KISS drummer Peter Criss is expected to be making a guest appearence on the album playing drums..... TOXIK are currently set to release their new album, Think This, on Roadracer Records in September. They have added to the line-up Charlie Sabin on vocals and John Donnelly as second guitarist The all-girl power metal band, ICE AGE, have finally settled down on a new line-up. Joining the three remaining members is vocalist Debbie Gunn (ex-ZNOWHITE/SENTINEL BEAST) and Italian guitarist Isabella Fronzoni. They are currently recording a new demo with hopes for a record deal CANDLEMASS has finished work on their fourth album titled Tales Of Creation. It will be released through Music For Nations label in Europe and Metal Blade Records in the U.S. It is set for a September

release in Europe but we here in the states will have to wait till January 1990 to see it in the stores.....Vocalist Ann Boleyn lead HELLION are currently working on their latest release titled The Black Book. Along with the new album comes a book written by Ann Boleyn to coincide with the album. The book and the album are scheduled for a September release It seems all is not well in the BLIND ILLUSION camp. Both Larry Lalonde and Les Claypool have left the band leaving the only remaining member of BLIND ILLUSION, Marc Biedermann, to himself. I'm not sure if the band is still on the Combat roster but things aren't looking good for the future of Marc and BLIND ILLUSION.....Florida metallists SAVATAGE are expected to come out with their new album titled Temptation Revelation on Atlantic Records. Their last release. Halls Of The Mountain King, put them on the doorstep to success so maybe this one will do it for them..... I don't know exactly what's going on between OMEN and Metal Blade Records but in a couple of weeks Metal Blade are set to release a new OMEN compilation album compiling the best songs from OMEN's first five albums. The new album is called Teeth Of The Hydra and is set for an October release. so buy it and let's make sure OMEN stay around....L.A. power metallists STEEL PROPHET have had a change in their lineup. Replacing Dominic on guitar is John Paget while Rick Mythiasin is the new vocalist. In the meantime, STEEL PROPHET are set to release their new demo in either October or November. Haven't heard anything from them in a while and their Thundersteel album was a killer.



When a band usually starts out they have to climb this big wall to be able to get a chance at stardom. A band will start out broke and stay broke unless they happen to get over this wall. The band being featured here, WRATHCHILD AMERICA, have gotten over this wall by signing a deal with Atlantic Records thus getting that buzz that can make or break a band. They've just recently released their debut *lbum, Climbin' The Walls, and are ready to take that leap into stardom. The following is an interview with two of the members of WRATHCHILD AMERICA, Brad Divens and Terry Carter:

So, tell us a little bit about WRATHCHILD AMERICA and its line-up. Terry: "Well, basically me and Shannon started the band a while back - around when we were still teenagers. We were very young and were basically a coversong band. We went through countless line-ups trying to find the right combination until we had found what we thought was "the" line-up which was me and Jay Abbene on guitars, Shannon Larkin on drums and Brad on bass and vocals."

Your now called WRATHCHILD AMERICA due to the legal hassles with the other WRATHCHILD in the U.K. Tell us about the final agreement between you two? Brad: "Well, we bent over and grabbed our ankles, wasted \$13,000 dollars and got fucked." Terry: "But we got to keep the name WRATHCHILD which was what we wanted to begin with." Brad: "Yeah, that was the cool part of the deal. The final agreement

between us two is that we get to keep the WRATHCHILD name but instead of just that we have to change our whole name in which we chose WRATHCHILD AMERICA. Now, \$13,000 dollars later, its settled." Terry; "But in that time span we got a shitload of press so personally it didn't hurt to much."

Its obvious that you two don't like eachother but in your own words tell me what you really think of them. Terry: "Shit, you should have figured it out by now. They are a bunch of homosexuals!" Brad: "Yeah, a bunch of homosexuals that write some of the shittiest music around. Next!..."

You've recently released your debut album, Climbin' The Walls, through Atlantic Records. Tell us about the album. Terry: "The album is basically a run through of all different types of music. When I listen to it I can hear stuff like blues, speed, jazz, heavy metal, etc. which is really what we're like. We all have our own influences - we just combine them to make one and that is WRATHCHILD AMERICA."

Included on the album is a cover of 'Time" which was originally done by PINK FLOYD. Who's idea was it to do this particular song and why one from PINK FLOYD? Terry: "Well, it was my idea and we all think that PINK FLOYD is a group that everybody likes, whether it be one song or a whole album. I've never met a person who didn't like them." Brad: "We didn't plan on recording it on the album when we went into the studio. Its just something that was decided on the spot.

Our producer, Mark Dearnley, had heard us play the song and suggested that we record it and include it on the album. We did "Time" basically because that was the best song of PINK FLOYD that we knew."

How did the deal with Atlantic Records come about? Terry: "Well, right after we parted with our bassist the four of us wrote four more songs, made a demo out of it and sent it out to all the labels. We waited for a while with nothing happening until a little bit later a few labels started contacting us. We got offers from Enigma, Combat and Restless. Then we got a call from Atlantic offering us a deal but then Capitol offered us another deal so we went back and forth between the two until finally settleling with Atlantic basically because of their track record. Atlantic are now breaking a lot of bands who are signed to them. Another reason for signing with Atlantic was because the contract gave us 100% full artistic and creative control which means that they can't tell us what to write, what to record, how to look, how to sound, etc. - what we do is totally up to us."

glam so we changed to jeans and T-shirts but now..." Brad: "Yeah, now where dressing the same as everybody else. We wanna be different but its getting hard to. I think maybe we'll go onstage naked for a gig. Shit, that'll be different!" Terry: "Nah, we can't do that because WRATHCHILD U.K. already does it and quite well too!"

Doesn't the band fear that maybe the band would be put in a corner when it came time for Atlantic to start their promoting? Terry: "Well, their metal department, which is only about one year old, doesn't have that many new metal bands so there is no real competition when it comes to promotion. I guess it'll depend on our record sales. They have the option to cancel the contract if our sales become poor." Brad: "But I don't think we'll get lost in a corner. We've got a lot of potential in us!"

What are your thoughts about the current Baltimore metal scene? It seems to me that it's becoming a hot-spot for AOR men and labels. Terry: "Well, finally now! It had its rough days



Speaking of looks, I can remember back when the band first started out you wore glam clothes but now its jeans and T-shirts. Why the change? Terry: "It was because it started getting to the point where every band you went to see had make-up on and stuff like that. Then we saw that the glam look was becoming popular and that everybody was dressing

there for a while. It's gonna grow but I don't think it'll be the next L.A. or New York."

Are you originally from the Baltimore area? Terry: "No, not really. Jay, our guitarist, lives in Baltimore right now but the rest of the band lives outside of the city. Me and Shannon are originally from West Virginia. Its like

this - we couldn't say that we're from Martinsburg, W. Virginia because they would probably end up saying something like "Where the hell is that!?" See What I'm saying? We went ahead and decided to use Baltimore basically because everybody knows where Baltimore is."

What are the future plans of the band? Terry: "Wait and see how the album sells. We wanna get more weird too. We want to bring more musical influences in

our songs. We want to be unpredictable."
What about touring? Any plans for a tour? Brad: "Yeah, we're going out on the road with ANNIHILATOR and TESTAMENT in the U.S. It's gonna be ultra cool. This spring we hope to be heading over to Europe. We have no definate tour dates so keep a look out for us."

Any last comments? Brad: "Thanks for the interview! Dial 1-800-DIAL-MTV and request our video. Also tell that red-neck bastard Neil Clifford that we want our goddamn \$1000 dollars he owes us!" Terry: "Don't get to comfortable with what we're doing now because I can tell you now that our next album will be totally different from our first."

Expect big things from and for this band. They are definitely going somewhere so stick with them and wait. They're be up there with them big boys of metal real soon.

FATES WARNING

Right now ballads seem to be what every band strives for to include in an album. Most of today's bands put ballads on their albums so that they could have something different than the rest of the songs. FATES WARNING have done the exact same thing but instead of just one song they have made practically a whole album out of ballads. Their latest release, Perfect Symmetry, is almost all ballads but this doesn't effect the album's listenability at all. In fact this is the best album in recent months to come out. FATES WARNING have done the perfect album! The following is an interview with Jim Matheos, guitarist for FATES WARNING:

Let's start by you telling us about your new drummer Mark Zonder. "He use to be the drummer for a band called WARLORD who were on Metal Blade a couple of years ago. He did some of the drum productions for Night Of The Brocken and Awaken The Guardian so we were aquainted with him. We liked his style a lot so after we decided to look for a new drummer he was our first choice. We really didn't do any auditions because he was the man we wanted."

So what happened with Steve Zimmerman? "Basically the change of our style of music aquired someone who was a lot more technical and proficiant with his instrument. Steve really wasn't progressing like the rest of the band."

Tell us about your new album, Perfect Symmetry. "Well, we're real happy with it. We think it's our most mature thing we've done. It shows a lot of progression from No Exit. We expanded our music and ideas as to not just be another metal album. A good example would be "At Fate's Hands". In that song there is keyboards and violin which made it different than the regular metal songs. Yeah it has a ballad feel to it but that was just the way it turned out. We knew we wanted to do something different so we just went with whatever we wrote.

Some people might think its a less heavier album than No Exit but I think where it lacks in the heavyness it makes up for in melody and just emotion overall."

Let's talk about the cover of the album. I think it's one of the better one's of the past couple of months. It's real thought provoking. It looks like a perfect symmetry but if you look at it closely the statue's shadow is different. Explain to us the cover. "Well, we did want it to come across as looking the same but also being different in places. The underline concept of the cover is the idea of how fine art is being turned out at a factory pace. It's sort of . representative of today's metal scene. Like how all these bands are popping up from all over the place with record deals and such. The cover was picked because it is symmetrical in that the guy is relatively the same as the Venus is symmetrical in the odd sort of way because she has no arms and represents an idealistic view."

How's the relationship with Metal Blade Records been now that FATES WARNING has a name for itself? "Great! We've been with them for a while now. It has been a great relationship between us two. Our bands name may have grown but so has the name of the label. They treat us real good."

Back to the album. On the song "At Fate's Hands" you got Kevin Moore of DREAM THEATRE to do the keyboards. How



did that come about? "Well, Kevin has been good friends with us for a while. They're like all our favorite band and We're like all their favorite band. When the slot came up for a keyboardist we wanted him to do it so we asked since he was such a great musician. He accepted our offer and went into the studio with us and recorded it. We think he did a great job."

Any plans on shooting a video? Your last video, "Silent Cries", didn't get much air play on MTV. "Yeah, we just did one a couple of weeks ago for "Through Different Eyes" which should be debuting on MTV in the near future. As for "Silent Cries", yeah it didn't get much air play but I think this one will be a lot different. The song is more accessable and the video comes across a lot better. We had a bigger budget this time which enabled us to do a lot more, like some conceptual ideas we had."

Any plans on touring here in the U.S.? "Yeah, we're gonna start rehearsing in L.A. like at the beginning of November which we'll start there and work our way across the country through November and December."

What happened with your European tour with METAL CHURCH? "Ouch! That was a weird happening. There was a problem with one of the member of METAL CHURCH, I think it was the drummer, so they just decided to cancel the tour. We were really looking forward to it too. Hopefully we can get hooked up with someone to go over to Europe."

What are your future plans for FATES WARNING? "Hope that our video gets good air play and to just tour all we can. We might be doing another video in the future but that's sort of in the air right now. Hopefully with this album we can get a bigger audience which is what we really need."

Any last comments? "Hope everyone likes the album and I hope people listen to it with an open mind. Don't expect to head No Exit part two because this is a lot different. We're happy with it!"

They may be happy with it but I'm fucking heads-over-heels for it. I admit to not being the world's biggest FATES WARNING fan but now I am. They have shown me that they definitely deserve what ever comes to them. The best album of '89?

Power metal, as of lately, is starting to become recognized by labels as a force in the metal scene. There are many bands, big and small, who are helping power metal take its place in the metal scene. One power metal band out of Pennsylvania, although still unsigned, should have no problem in leading this power metal movement. The band is KRAZE and with their very strong demo they should have no problem in securing an independent label deal. The following is an interview with Tom Landis, guitarist for KRAZE:

KRAZE has been together approximitly five years or so. We are a four piece band with Cory and me being the only original members. We've known eachother for about eight years now. Cory Laity is our second guitarist and vocalist for the band. Kip Forbes, our newest member, is our bassist. He joined up with us in January of '89. Our drummer is Gary Leny who has been with us since '83. Although we've been around for a while, its only been in the last two years that we have been getting recognition from fans and fanzines throughout the world."

Now on to your music. I can hear plenty of ANTHRAX influences in your music - like stuff from their first two albums. I'm not one to compare but there is a big simularity especially with two of the songs off of your latest demo. Am I correct in stating this simularity? "Yeah, your almost correct. We grew up on that stuff - early METALLICA and ANTHRAX but we also grew up with the likes of KISS and U.F.O. Yeah, some of

our music does sound like ANTHRAX but in no way are we cloning. We just write what we write"

While on the subject of ANTHRAX, what do you think of them at the present day? "The new ANTHRAX? I still like them but I'd much rather listen to their older stuff but that's my opinion.
ANTHRAX is at that stage where they could care less what people think about them because of their popularity."

What are your thoughts about the metal scene today? How long do you think its popularity will continue? "I hope that the metal scene doesn't stay in the out that its in. Every label seems to be trying to sign bands like GUNS N' ROSES. Some power metal and speed metal bands are getting some push, but not enough to make any difference in the underground. I mean its still all either thrash or glam. We hope that the industry will open up to bands like us. I think that in the future the inbetween bands are gonna be the most sought after and take over the metal scene like thrash once did.

Has there been any record label interest in the band? "Are you kidding? Atlantic and Elektra have called us up the other day and tried to make us an offer. CBS's new metal label told us to hold until they talk to us. Now you tell me if interest is coming? To be truthful though I must say that interest in the band is nil. I only wish all these major labels were calling us up. The bad news is that labels don't seem to know us but the good news is that KRAZE does have a song out on a compilation album titled Heavy Artillery. The song is "Devil In

Disguise". The album should be out this fall on Auburn Records. We are hoping that this album will gain us more exposure other than our demos."

Any plans for touring? "Well, first we are gonna concentrate on getting us a deal. Then after our deal we will start touring. We're hoping soon a label will give the band a deal so that we can tour. If we did get a deal than that's when album sales come into the picture - that ll determine if we get a tour or not! I'm pretty confident that we'll get something if we get a deal."

What are the future plans for KRAZE? "To put out a record and go on a world tour. We are concentrating on recording new material and sending out our promos to the labels - we hope to be signed by the end of '89."

Any last comments? "Yeah, thanks for the interview. Also thanks to all our loyal fans whom have supported us around the world. You both rule!"

KRAZE is a band worthy of your support and a record deal. Watch out for KRAZE in the future because I've got a

It's time once again for me to speak my mind about certain issue in the metal scene. This time though I would like to talk about a topic instead of criticizing it or giving it a thumbs up. The topic? What is power metal? I consider power metal as being metal that isn't fast yet very powerful but isn't slow enough to be wimpy, exception being doom metal. There's all types of power metal. There's melodical power metal, speed power metal and just plain power metal. To me power metal is an alternative to those who like their metal aggressive and heavy but not fast or wimpy.

Now, why hasn't power metal gotten the respect it deserves? People seem to think that power metal is only for a certain type of metalhead. Thrashers look down on it because its to wimpy and glamsters look down on it because its to heavy. If this is the case than explain to me how bands like METALLICA, MEGADETH, TESTAMENT and ANTHRAX can be so popular. I consider these and many others power metal bands yet these four are popular among everybody - thrashers, glamsters

Has anybody noticed how many thrash bands are slowing down their music to have a more heavy sound? I could go on and on naming bands with recent releases that are much slower than their previous recordings. This is where I always get pissed off! How can thrashers tell me that power metal is wimpy when bands like METALLICA, TESTAMENT, WHIPLASH and MEGADETH have taken to the power metal sound. I don't hear anybody calling METALLICA wimpy yet mention a band such as LIEGE LORD or SWORD and you get a shitty answer like "Who are they?" or "They're no good"answer. I don't understand it! Well, what can you do? I have this gut feeling though that in one or two years power metal will be the hot thing and instead of bands trying for that thrash tag they'll instead try for that power metal tag.

Before I finish I just want to say one thing. I'm not anti-thrash, in fact there are a few thrash bands I like, its just that I get pissed when I hear ex-thrash bands like METALLICA or TESTAMENT playing power metal, yet still being called thrash, and getting bigger because of it when there's plenty of bands who are original power metal bands still struggling to get recognition.

Face it! Power metal is the future. Thrash and glam will always be with us but soon power metal will be king. I leave you with the Gillespie theory of power metal: aggression + heavyness - the speed factor = power metal.

Females have long made their presence known in the metal scene since the beginning of rock n' roll. Although rock n' roll spread into different styles, in this case metal, it was and still is dominated by men. Now its changing with the sudden popping up of many all-girl bands or female-lead bands. Helping with this change is one female named Leather Leone. She has released her first solo project called Shock Waves recently (by the time you read this it will most definitely be dated) which is definitely a killer. The following is an interview with Leather Leone about her first solo project:

First lets start from the backbone of the band. Can you tell us who the musicians are that backed you up on your album? "There was John Luke He'Bert on drums, David Harbar on bass and Michael Harris on guitar. John and David are now part of CHASTAIN. Michael is from the state of Ohio and now plays in his own band called ARCH RIVAL."

Are you satisfied with their performances on your album? "Yeah, definitely! I was very pleased with their performances and am greatly appreciative of their help. I wanted only the best on this album and I knew what they were capable of so - here's the finished product."

Tell us about the album and its songs. "Well, Shock Waves for me was a lashing out to the world around me. I was always being disappointed and getting fustrated too many times so I decided to take it and use it for something good - that being the album. As for the songs, they were written from inside me so are very personal. The lyrics actually speak

for themselves."

You wrote most of the lyrics but the songs were most of Davids. Don't you fear that people will think this another CHASTAIN project instead of your album? "Unfortunately that is inevitable but David is the person I work with and he is how the public relates to me. It does get fustrating at times but I figure if I can get it across to enough people than maybe they'll see the difference. Anyways, any real CHASTAIN fan will hear the difference and other will learn the difference."

You've been a member of CHASTAIN for quite a while now so why has it taken you so long to do a solo album? "Well, it was Davids idea after I kept complaining about the lack of press towards me. He originally suggested it a while back but it wasn't until later that his idea really sank in. I figured that I hadn't anything to loose so I went for it. My idea of music is a bit different from Davids. I enjoy expressing myself both emotionally and physically through my music."

What's the relationship like between you and David now that you have a side project going? "Its still better than ever! David only wants what I want. He's extremely encouraging and is behind my solo project 100%. Besides, why would he help me out so much on my project if he didn't want me to succeed? Me and David have been through to much to let a little thing like this to get inbetween our friendship."

If Shock Waves is successful, is there a chance that you may choose to go separate ways from CHASTAIN? "Well, I see no reason why that would happen but if the LEATHER project were to become major, well, let's just say that for my part CHASTAIN may be put on hold. Its sort of hard to give you a straight answer for this question but you never know what could happen. For now I have no plans of breaking away from CHASTAIN."

How long do you plan on doing your project and when can we expect another LEATHER album? "I want to do this as long as I can. The problem is that I have so many other things going on that its hard to keep up. For now I plan on doing another album. It probably won't be out until sometime next year though. I guess that it'll all depend on what happens this year. All this is great for expectations but that's all it is for now - expectations. I'm just gonna concentrate on CHASTAIN for now and wait and see about LEATHER."

Any plans on touring as LEATHER without any CHASTAIN back-ups? "I have been trying to work it out. Being on an independent label also makes it difficult because they don't give as much tour support as the bigger labels. I'm gonna give it a try anyways!"

What are the future plans for your solo career? "First, to get a major deal and be able to compete with all the major bands. I know that I'm worthy of it all and can do it. Shock Waves is only the beginning!"



Any last comments? "Check out Shock Waves! I can rock with the best of them, let me inspire you!"

What determination she has! I'll second her motion about her ability to rock with the best of them. Check out Shock Waves because I know it'll surprise you like it did me. Move over Doro Pesch!

When one thinks of a place like Denmark one tends to think more of a natural serene than metal music. When you think of metal, well there isn't much to think about. Denmark isn't known for its metal scene, in fact I only know of one other band that's come from Denmark and that's KING DIAMOND. Other than that I come up with a blank. Well, now you can add another band from Denmark. Their name is METAL CROSS and are an excellent power metal band. In a few more years they could be very popular in the underground. The following is an interview with Henrik Kjellerup, vocalist for METAL CROSS:

Tell us about METAL CROSS and its line-up. "We've been together since 1984 starting out here in Denmark. We were together for about four or five years and decided to do a recording to get our name around the scene. That first recording is called Metal Cross and had a total of five songs. After that we did a couple of compilations but still nothing really happened. We got our act together again and recorded our second demo called M.A.D.H.O.U.S.E. which had three songs on it. We were very satisfied with this one and thought that it would get us the exposure we needed. The response to this demo has been great from magazines and fans alike. We've gotten some label interest so atleast we're getting recognized. Our original line-up had lasted for about three and a half years but recently it was changed. We've added Ole Quist to our band - he plays bass. The rest of us are from the original line-up - Michael Hartmann and Jon Lyback on guitars, Peter Mogenson on drums and me on vocals."

So how's the response been to METAL CROSS's releases? "Really quite good! Our latest demo, M.A.D.H.O.U.S.E., has in the past four or five months received good reviews in zines throughout the world, well, nearly! We're starting to get orders on the demo from metal fans from various countries. This we take as a good sign of things to come. We feel that we must be doing something right if we getting this good of a response."

Has there been any label interest in the band? "Well, we did get a very nice letter from a label in the U.S. and we did have some hopes with a Danish label but the U.S. label found it to hard to deal with us because of the distance between us land wise and that Danish label later found themselves short of money so they sort of backed out. These two were let downs but now we have another Danish label showing interest in us and hopefully we can land us a deal. After all the stuff we've been through recently we don't take anything for granted - not before we have signed the dotted line!

Do you think by playing power metal you could be hindering your success? I mean, it seems that only thrash or glam bands actually get anywhere these days. "Well, your right about that. Maybe we'll have to wait a few more years to get the limelight but we like playing this type of metal and if it takes us longer, than it'll take us longer. We aren't going to play something that we aren't into. That's way to fake and will probably back-fire in the long run. We believe enough in our own ability and in our music so to the point that we don't have to give in. We know there is still an audience for this type of music who are

waiting for the return of "true" metal so maybe one day we'll be able to give them what they want while being at a higher status than we are now."

There's no doubt that Sweden's metal scene is growing but do you think that this could have an effect on you and the Danish metal scene? "Well, most of the new bands coming from Sweden are thrash/death bands and really...! But yes, some new Danish thrash bands are coming up from the cellar and are starting to be noticed but as for them, or any other metal band here in Denmark, we all fight against eachother no matter what type of



metal you play. We have so many limitations here in Denmark (labels, promoters, agents, venues, etc.) that its tough. Hopefully, some day soon, heavy metal will no longer be a swearword to the whole music industry, as it almost is today. As for Sweden's metal scene helping us out, no. There may be a slight

influence for us but not much to get a band noticed by labels, especially U.S. labels. Denmark is such a small country that it can't really support a metal scene. There are only a few bands around worthy enough of label interest so really I don't see Sweden's metal scene giving us much of an impact."

What are your future plans for METAL CROSS? To get a record deal and to get support slots for the big name bands that come through Scandinavia. I hope for a new LP real soon along with a full European tour and then the rest of the world. We can do it!"

Any last comments? "Yeah, thanks to POWER PACKER for its interest in our band - we appreciate it very much. What you do for bands like us! Keep up the good work and the best of luck in the future. To all POWER PACKER readers we say - buy our demo instead of the next GUNS N' ROSES LP because you all know how they will sound. Cheers!"

It isn't to bad but what makes this a little poor is the production. It's very messy so it does make it difficult to actually hear the music. There is a total of nine songs with "Salem Girls" and "Beat A Dead Horse" as my favorites. I was expecting this to be thrash when I looked at the cover. Hell, it's not even power metal. Solitude is a word which means calmness in the English Dictionary. Aeturnus is a latin word which means eternal. Combine these two words together and you get Solitude Aeturnus - an eternal calmness. The band SOLITUDE AETURNUS may not be an eternal calmness but they are an eternal storm storming across the Texas scene into international status. Their name is well known in the underground scene, especially among the doom metallists. An album is expected from the band sometime in the future. The following is an interview with John Perez, guitarist and founder of SOLITUDE AETURNUS:

Let's start with you telling us about the band and its line-up. "Well, SOLITUDE AETURNUS was initially concieved by myself in the Spring of '87. I had just quit my former band, ROTTING CORPSE, with the intention of forming an ultra heavy band with the emphasis on heavy and not necessarily thrash. After months and months of searching, I had found the line-up which consisted of Kristoff Gabehart on vocals, Brad Kane on drums, Tom Martinez and myself on guitar and Chris Hardin on bass. This line-up has since broken up but now the new line-up consists of Edgar Rivera and myself on guitar, Lyle Steadham on drums, Robert Lowe on vocals and the only remaining member, besides me, from the original line-up, Chris Harden on bass. The lineup of the band has changed but the original concept of the band has not."

So what happened with the old lineup? Problems among the band members? "Yeah, just various problems. Kristoff lived nearly 300 miles away while wanting to spend more time with his Christian calling. Brad wanted to play more of a thrash style while Tom plain just didn't have his shit together. I don't really like line-up changing but sometimes its a must if the band is to progress. I'm not a hard person to get along with - all I ask of band members is an honest and sincere interest in the music and a 100% positive attitude. If they don't have that than they're wasting time for myself and the other members of the band."

The bands name use to be SOLITUDE but now you've changed the name to SOLITUDE AETURNUS. Why the name change? "Well, unfortunatly there is another band with the same name from Delaware that claimed the rights to it. That I'm not to mad over anymore. What really pissed me off about it was the fact that I had been pushing my band for over a year under the name SOLITUDE before I ever heard of these guys and the band. If they're so serious than why hadn't I seen anything from them in the underground mags or anywhere else for that matter? Its only recently that I've begun to see anything on them. It just kind of pisses me off. Anyways, back to the name change. Instead of just totally dropping the name, which would have hurt us, we just added -Aeturnus which is Latin for eternal. We like the change, it adds to the gothic feel that we try to put across to everybody.

Has there been any label interest in the band? I heard that you were negotiating with Mean Machine Records. "Yeah, we are currently trying to get a deal with them. Nothing is certain right



now but I hope something comes through for us."

What are your thoughts about the current status of doom metal? It seems to have become very popular with all types of metal heads. Why do you think this is? "I think that the area of doom metal has been lucky enough because there hasn't been very many bands that have touched on it. It's an area of metal that seems to be the alternative for everyone who wants to listen to something different from their regular music. Say for instance someone likes only thrash, well, there's got to be a time when he wants to here something different so that's when he turns to doom metal. Its heavy enough for him. Doom metal is a very personal type of music - it's full of emotion and power. Actually I kind of hope that there won't be a ton of doom metal bands because then I think it would lose some of its appeal, like thrash metal."

Any plans on touring? "Not until we can get financial backing from a record

company. There's no way we could finance it ourselves. We'll just play a few gigs around the Ft. Worth/Dallas area and other parts around Texas. I do hope we can get a tour going though."

So what are your future plans for SOLITUDE AETURNUS? "Well, we want to release records that contain some of the heaviest music ever heard. In fact I wouldn't mind it if we were the heaviest band around. We'd like to be able to tour Europe someday. Hopefully we will be able to secure a good record deal real soon."

Any last comments? "Thanks for the chance to be in your 'zine. Be open-minded towards all types of metal. Believe me there's tons of good metal bands out there that's not just thrash and speed. Write to us for our tape and shirts! \$5.00 for our tape and \$10.00 for our shirts."

Chalk up another strong doom metal contender. Yes this style may be growing but practically every band is either good or excellent, unlike other styles that range from poor to excellent.

SOLITUE AETURNUS is a name to watch out for, let's just hope that they get that record deal.



To catagorize a band is like catagorizing a person - either he/she is a snob or a nice, cool person. Some people though can't be catagorized because they aren't either of the above. They're just out of the ordinary which is what this band out of California is, out of the ordinary. This band is DEAD ON and they can't be catagorized. They're definitely not death metal nor are they thrash or power metal. They have released their debut album on SBK Records with another one not too far behind. Things sound as if they're ready for the big time. Let's find out! The following is an interview with Mike Caronia, guitarist for DEAD ON:

Well, let's start by you telling us a little about DEAD ON and its line-up. I must admit that I'm not to familiar with the band. "Well, a couple years ago we all started this band playing much of the lighter stuff in metal. At the time we were a Long Island band just jamming. We then got serious and starting writing much more heavier music while at the same time trying to fit in our new drummer. We started playing the club scene in New York - CBGB's, Sun Dance, L'Amours, stuff like that - but weren't satisfied with the clubs we were playing at because they were basically the only clubs in New York that would book us. That's when we decided to move out here to California and try our luck here. The line-up of DEAD ON is me and Tony Frazzitta on guitars, John Linder on bass, Mike Raptis on vocals and Mike Caputo on drums."

Speaking about the new album, tell us a little about it. "Well, most of the songs are about death but we didn't mean

for it to come out like that - it just happened. The album was really recorded a while back before we got our deal. It's sort of old but still new. Anyways, we are finishing up writing for our new album which shouldn't take to much longer to finish. I don't know, the album I guess speaks for itself. It's DEAD ON - it's what we're about. It's heavy and fast but nothing like thrash/death and it's melodic but nothing like glam."

Let's talk about your bands name, DEAD ON. To me its sounds like a death metal band - something you say you strive not to be. Don't you think that death metallists might get your album, listen to it and call it wimpy thus spreading a bad name among death metallists? "Yeah but it's not that way! I mean, they could think that but we keep telling everyone that we're not death metal - its more of a progressive speed. DEAD ON is just a name. It doesn't mean death but just dead on. You know, DEAD ON! Our logo does have that coffin in it so I can see a little bit where you're coming from. We have a back up though called a sticker. On all the albums we have a little sticker saying that we're not death metal so that should keep death metallists away, but, I don't know, I hope they give it a try anyways."

The band is signed to SBK Records out of New York. This is the first I've ever heard of them. Can you tell us a little bit about them? "They use to be just a publishing firm but then EMI Records needed a new North American label so they turned SBK into a record label. At the moment they have seven or eight bands on their roster - we're the only heavy band they have on the label. They're always asking us for suggestions."


So how did the deal with SBK Records come about? "Well, it was this show at CBGB's that got it for us. Actually we got kicked out of the club in order for the B-52's to do a video shoot. Anyways, we played nexr door. We had contacted a few labels to see if they would come and see us and a representative of SBK was there. He came up to us and said that they wanted to sign us so we signed the dotted line and here we are."

The band, along with the new album, also have a few songs on the new Shocker soundtrack. How did this come about? Through the record label? "Yeah, it was through the label. SBK had something to do with the soundtrack deal. The song "Different Breed" is on the Shocker soundtrack. It was edited a bit but it's still good. We also have two other songs on the upcoming Immediate Family soundtrack. The songs are "Salem Girls" and "Full Moon".

Any tour plans for the band? "Well, we're hoping to get on tour in November and hopefully get a nationwide tour. We are trying right now for the OVER KILL tour but we don't know for sure if we'll get it. What we might do is go ahead and put together our own tour playing at all the clubs on our own. It'll hopefully be nationwide. Nothing really concrete as of yet though."

So what are your future plans for the band? "Well, first thing is making the video for "Full Moon", get on a tour and then work on the new album which is gonna be out sooner than people may think it will."

Any last comments? "Well, we'd like to thank the record company for their support. Buy our tape!" Are they ready for the big time? Well, they had better be because when a band gets a major deal and a major tour the big time is bound to come your way. It may start off slow at first but when your name gets around things start to roll. A video on MTV, with over-time air play, will get you the big time. Hang tight because with backing like this its bound to come.


I keep telling everybody that power metal is the music of the future but still nobody believes me. I may be having trouble convincing people now but in the future it should be a lot easier. Why? Because I have bands like WHIPLASH who I can give as an example. The new WHIPLASH has just released their third album, Insult To Injury, on Roadracer Records and after a couple of listens I think you'll agree with me that their on their way up. Yes they have slowed down a bit but what difference should that make. WHIPLASH is still WHIPLASH no matter what kind of music they play. The following is an interview with the bass player of WHIPLASH, Tony Bono:

Let us start with the changing of the line-up. You have a new vocalist by the name of Glen Hannsen. Tell us about him and how he got into the band. "Well, Clen is originally from Brooklyn. He and Joey, our drummer, had been jamming around with the neighborhood guys in Brooklyn when Joey had told us about Glen and how his vocals were really good. We Were looking for a vocalist at the time so we asked Glen if he wanted to try out for the band. He agreed to try out so he came to a rehersal one day and did a great job at vocals. We were very impressed with his vocals so we asked him if he wanted to be in the band and he agreed. We had written most of the music at the time so we all agreed to let Glen write most of the lyrics. Things just Worked out for all of us - he fit in just like a puzzle."

Who's idea was it to try and find a vocalist? "It was Tony's idea because he had trouble being both a vocalist and a guitarist. When it came time to do shows he felt he couldn't give 100%. Also after every show his throat would be sore from the vocals. He hadn't any vocal lessons so he wasn't really a true vocalist. He

had always been thinking about looking for a vocalist but never did find one that he thought would be good enough for the band. Plus with our new music we thought that we would need a better vocalist that was more suitable for our music. Also Tony wanted to concentrate more on his guitar playing. We think that our live show will be ten times better now that each of us can concentrate more on our own instruments."

Alright, you've got a new vocalist



but do you think that maybe a second guitarist will be sought after in the future? "No, I don't think so. We thought about it before we got Glen but finally decided against it. We really don't need another guitar player because when we play live, now that Tony isn't singing, he goes wild. My bass playing is now good enough so that we really don't need a rhythem guitarist. I really don't think Tony wants to compete with another guitar player anyways."

Tell us a little bit about the album? "It was produced by Tom Morris and I'm sure we will go back to him on the next album. We experimented with

different scales trying to be different. We didn't want to come up with the same old stuff that was on our previous albums. We were trying to come closer to what our live sound would be like - like "Hiroshema", "Ticket To Mayhem" and "Insult To Injury", we cut out some of the rhythem guitar parts so that it would come closer to what we sound like live. We just wanted to keep our music fresh and to stay away from the typical thrash/death stuff that we've done in the past. We don't want to close the doors infront of us!"

What about the bands musical change from thrash to power metal? What prompted this change? "It just came naturally for us. When you play 'Message In Blood" fifty-thousand times you tend to want to change to a different style. We were trying new things like keyboards and stuff like that. In fact that's how "Essence Of Evil" came about. I think that next time we go into the studio we're gonna write with nothing in mind. We won't go in trying to write a certain way. We'll just gonna go in and play and what ever comes out comes out. If we like it than we'll use it, if not than we'll drop it."

I thought that the original album title was Rape Of The Mind. Instead it says Insult To Injury. What happened? "Yeah, your right about that. It was gonna be called Rape Of The Mind but we just thought that that title wasn't good enough for a name like WHIPLASH. Insult To Injury was a much better title because it was more WHIPLASH. What I mean is that the word whiplash is a meaning for an injury to the reck, so, it's an injury that fits our music. Thus Insult To Injury."

You've been with Roadracer Records for quite a while now. What's the relationship like between you two? "I don't really know. Monte has been a follower of WHIPLASH ever since the bands early days so I think of him as a friend but he's still a businessman before friend. There really isn't to much of a relationship between us two. About the only thing we have in common is that both

of us want to sell WHIPLASH to the metal scene. We both want album sales to be high and we both want to see WHIPLASH become a success. Other than that I don't think there's to much going on between us two."

There's no doubt that WHIPLASH has changed their musical direction from thrash to power metal. Do you think that you will loose a lot of thrash fans because of them saying that the new album is too wimpy? "I think that a lot of those who liked Tony's vocals might say to hell with it and not buy the album but the music, I mean, I can't understand how they could have said that there was a difference between Power And Pain and Ticket To Mayhem. They were saying that we wimped out with Ticket To Mayhem but I'm saying to myself, "God, how could you say that - this shits just as heavy as it ever was!" On this album it's still us three, except now we have Glen, and it's undeniably WHIPLASH. If the kids don't like the vocals, well, they can go back to their death records."

Any plans on shooting a video for MTV or something like that? "No, not right now. We talked about it for a while but the label had to many strings attached. They would tell us that we could do a video but only if we signed to a major booking agency so it sort of left us in the middle. A Catch-22 type of situation. I don't know if a video would help us any ways because MTV only play the more established acts."

Any plans for touring? "Its being worked out right now as we speak. We're getting things together so that if we tour we'll be ready. I can't say to much for the U.S. because nothing is in the definite. As for Europe, we have a couple of agencies over there that want us to come over. Our main concern right now is to get a tour together for the U.S. We really want to tour!"

So what are the future plans for WHIPLASH? "To get caught in that viscious circle of going into the studio, recording the album, promoting it, touring, writing and then going back into the studio to repeat the whole process.

Along with this circle we want to party our asses off. It would be our reward for working our asses off."

Any last comments? "Yeah, first let me thank you for the interview. I want everyone reading this to come and see us play live because it has improved 100% and now that Tony can concentrate on guitar, well, he rages. I'm in a more raging mood and am confident in myself that I can give 100%. When we go on this U.S. tour we're gonna kick some ass and take no prisoners. This is it! Its now or never for us. 

MYSTIC FORCE/CRIMSON GLORY Oct. 16,1989 9:30 Club



In the beginning, our planet earth was nothing but a slab of molten lava and had an atmosphere with nothing but poisonous gases. Centuries later though, planet earth was covered with a whole sheet of pure ice. It had changed from a hot, poisonous planet into an iced earth. Well, today ICED EARTH is the name of a band from the Tampa, Florida area. Their latest demo, Enter The Realm, is a very well packaged demo and includes some very promising metal. The following is an interview with three members of ICED EARTH, Greg, Dave and Randy:

So, tell us about ICED EARTH and its line-up. Greg: "Well, we started the band back in January of '85. Back then we were called PURGATORY -60-. We then changed our name to ICED EARTH and recorded our second demo, Enter The Realm. Now we're ready to become as big as the likes of METALLICA or IRON MAIDEN. Someday! As far as our line-up goes. well, there's me, Greg Seymour, on drums, Jon Schaffer and Randy Shawver on guitar, Gene Adam, our vocalist, and Dave Abell on bass."



Any reasoning why the band chose ICED EARTH as its name? It is an out of the ordinary name. Greg: "Well, like I said earlier, we had to change our name once before so when we chose this name we were going to make sure that it was a name that no one else would think of. The name ICED EARTH sounded cool at the time. We have since incorporated ICED EARTH as to make certain that we would have it all to ourselves."

Tell us about your latest demo, Enter The Realm. Dave: "Enter The Realm is our second recorded release. It was recorded at Morrisound's 24-track room. We feel that this demo features our best material to date and are very proud of it. The tape is 22-minutes long, give or take a few, with a total of six songs. The one track that we feel is our best is the song "Iced Earth". There's also an acoustical piece entitled "Solitude". We feel that now with this tape we can step up to a much bigger market. All I can say is, enjoy!..."

I've asked this question many a times but never getting a straight answer. Your answer is probably no different but here goes anyways. Has there been any label interest in the band? Randy: "Well, our answer is going to be the same as everybody else's in that yeah we've had label interest but no we're not gonna tell you who. Understand that we can't be spreading false rumours if a deal falls through. I'll just say that we're waiting for the right deal to come along."

Let's talk about the band itself. Your lyrics and dress deal a lot with the mystic/mediavel times. Do you plan on taking this as far as say CRIMSON GLORY or CANDLEMASS has? Dave: "The

lyrical content in our songs deals with a lot of different experiences really. As far as mystical/mediavel themes go, yeah I can understand where your coming from and you do have a point. Our lyrics and clothes don't help us much with trying not to be put in a mystical/mediavel catagory but its what we like and we'll stick with it. In our live set-up, the stage is covered with smoke and the drum riser is enclosed by a rough iron fence covered with cobwebs and skulls. We also have flames going off during the show. A better word for our stage show would be gothic. This is what makes the band. Its expensive but is effective. As far as CRIMSON GLORY or CANDLEMASS goes, we don't want to be like them and will do whatever it takes not to be like them." Any plans for touring? Greg: "As of

now, no. Right now we're working on getting a record contract. Once we've secured that than hopefully we'll tour our asses off!"

What are the future plans for the band? Greg: "To be the biggest metal band ever! We want to make music that will last forever."

Any last comments? Greg: "You'll never hear any last words from us! I do wanna thank you for the interview and keep up the good work. People like you keep bands like us going."

Can ICED EARTH ever be the biggest band around? There's a possibility but they would have to be very patient. Nothing comes easy and/or fast (unless your an L.A. glam band) but if ICED EARTH can hang in there than there's a chance.
