MM What happened to John Alexander, Post Mortem's former

quitarist?

MK He quit in Ohio. We were playing a show in Ohio and he didn't want to do an encore. Everyone was really getting into the show so we said right over the mike, "Well, if you don't want to play, why don't you just quit the band." And he got really upset with that and said, "O.K., I quit, I quit." Our drummer Rick said, "Well, why don't you just play one more song?"And we tried to persuade him to go back and play the rest of the show but he wouldn't do it. People in the crowd were going over to him and telling him to get back up there and he still wouldn't do it.So we just him in Ohio. It was our show too.

MM You haven't released anything since?

MK We have a new E.P. called "The Missing Link". Two of the songs on the E.P. were recorded when "Coroner's we did the album Office".A song called "Caveman" and the other is called "Organized Crime". Do you have the cassette of "Coroner's Office" or the album itself?

MM The album. I have the red vinyl

MK Oh, all right. Well, there's a song on the cassette, it was like a bonus song. That song is also on the E.P. There are two songs on the other side of the E.P. that we recorded in California. We practiced with the two guitarists from War God for awhile, while we were in California.

There is gonna be a picture of him on the back of the record too. It's kinda like a perspective of the band. It will have the two guitarists, from War God, that played on our tracks in California. 

His name is "BEAST" and he's looney. Where did this guy come from?!?! I know many of you haven't seen this dood before but he's great! I can honestly say this is one of the more interesting interviews in this issue. Is this guy as funny as he looks? Yes! Read On! (only kidding guy)

MM Tell us about your latest masterpiece.

B The new record is called "Carnival Of Souls".

MM That's all you're going to tell me? Come on Beast, I want the

whole ten yards!

- The first one was on Napalm Records and that was "The Beast Has Arrived". It did O.K. considering it was a small label and they didn't really sink any money into it. As far as promotion went, I pretty much did all that myself. They got out a few ads in magazines and that was about it. They sent it out. It got reviewed in a couple of fanzines and "Metal Forces". For the most part, it was the kind of label where, ya know, "We'll sign you but try to get out on tour." It's like, "Oh yea, I'm gonna do all that by myself!"It was a good step in the right direction because at least we got something out.
- MM Just how many did you get out, Beast?
- Napalm, what they did was, the first pressing was 2,000 copies. They sold out in a day and a half! Shocked everybody there, including me!So, then they went for another 2,000 and they sold out of that. Then they printed up a thousand. All-inall, they printed up about 5,000 copies of the record. Some went to England and the rest was all around the country here. So, in that respect, I guess they were kind of fooled by it, ya know? They wasn't really sure what to expect. I was the first kinda crossover act they had signed. They were doin' a lot of generic metal bands, ya know, your basic stuff. They weren't really into any crossover hardcore, thrashin' kind of stuff. So for the most part, it

did surprize them. So, ya know, it was good in a way. Plus, the album cover was kinda funny.

MM Who did the cover?

B A friend of mine, he works for a lot of biker magazines, Steve Bonge. He has been our resident photographer. You can't open up a biker magazine without seeing his name. As a matter of fact, in the last issue of "Outlaw Biker", they did a whole two or three page color article about him. And he did pictures for other mags too. We try to make him like our "Big Daddy Ross of the eighties". You know who Big Daddy Ross was?

MM No.

B He was kind of like a custom car man of the fifties. You used to see his face on all his crazy models and things that he used to... That's why on the back of all our album covers, we always show a picture of Steve Bonge. If you see his picture, you'll know why.

MM Thanks.

B He is a pretty bizarre character. He's a lot of fun. He does a lot of good photography and he's becoming more and more well known in and around New York. He's a good guy and we work together well with him. We have been friends since, like years and years. So it pays to have someone with a creative eye like him to help you out. He's got a good sense of humor, just like us.He's just like one of the gang.

MM He did the cover for "Carnival Of Souls" too?

B He shot the pictures for that album too.A little, seedy carnival comes to our town every year, not far from us.Passin' by there one day, it was like, "Wow, we got to go there and take some pictures!" It was, ya know,



a little, seedy carnival from Kentucky pulls in here and we are out there and I'm dressed in a priest's uniform. Steve looks like a maniac too and we are standing in front of a carrousel taking pictures. So, the results were real good. He got some really good shots. The cover of the new one is me standing in front of a carrousel, he left the shutter open, and the carrousel is spining around with trails of light. It came out fantastic!

MM Some bizarre shit.

The Beast stuff isn't serious, as you can well imagine. I don't really try to dwell on serious subjects. Even if it's a serious subject, I don't take seriously. All the words are always... I always go for something more amusing than being real serious and crying about some social bullshit. If you can't laugh at it ... ya know, sense of humor is the most important thing in the music. I don't like being serious about it.Not that I don't like serious bands and stuff, 'cause I do, but I just can't be like that. It's just not my personality. So, that's why we interject a lot of humor into the stuff. MM Who plays on the new record?

The new record is me and Guitar Pete, and his drummer, John. Pete also plays bass because the guy we were using wasn't available

at the time.

MM So you and Guitar Pete are the only two members in the band that played on the first album, "We Have Arrived"?

On the first album, me and Pete are the only members! We did

everything.

MM Then who was "Creepy"?

B I made up the name Creepy. It was done on a real tight budget so that's why I made up the phoney dood called Creepy. I hear the first album now and I cringe 'cause the production is real bad. But at least it got our foot in the door. We did it real cheap. I think the whole album cost \$300!

My God! That is cheap! MM

On an 8-track studio, some guys did it for us. We recorded it in 15 hours because we didn't have any money. Usually, when you go on a label to try to get an ad-vance, you make a demo, and you go in. Let's put it this way, a demo would have cost more to make than it would for the entire album. So we went in and did it. We weren't sticklers for production value. We said, "Look, we don't care if it sounds trashy 'cause that's the sound we want." But now, we kind of want to put out something we'll be proud of down the line. Not that I don't like the songs on the first album, because a lot of the songs I still like, but the production is ... you want to everything strong and powerful. The new one is a lot more powerful. Songs just kind of jump right out at you on the new one. The first one was sloppy 'cause we did it so quick and we must have did everything in two takes. It still makes me laugh. I still like some of the songs. The new one sounds a lot better and it's real powerful. The energy kind of jumps right

The first one was so cheap, it MM probably paid itself over a few

times.

I'm tellin' ya. I'm tellin' ya! MM Maybe that's the way to do it! B The thing to do is to get an album on a European label, get it on an American label here. So instead of just getting an advance from one company, you sell it to England, you could sell it to France, and then you could try to get it out here and, ya know, instead of getting \$5,000 for the advance on an album, you could get a possible \$7,000 or \$8,000, which by today's standards ain't that great. Independents don't really want to go

huge. They just hope that you're gonna go. Look at Metallica. They were signed to, ya know, what was "Kill'em All" on?

MM Megaforce... I said MEGAFORCE!

Ya, Megaforce. Now look, they went big, now "Kill'em All" has probably sold, ya know, a million copies. They're at Megaforce countin' their loot. They got it for a song. They just took a chance with Metallica. Ya know, "Wow, these guys are good, we'll sign 'em." And they prayed that Metallica would get picked up by a major label. I guess Flotsam and Jetsam are going through the same thing. First they were on Metal Blade, now Electra picked them up. So if they become big, real big, that means that album they did for the small, independent label will go big and they'll make a ton of money. But that's all finance shit and it's boring. Who really cares anyway? I guess the main thing is I like to go out and play live anyway.

MM As far as live Beasts go, do they stay within the borders of

New York state?

All I did was N.Y. shows. The first show I did live, I did a club in N.Y. that wasn't exactly known for my kind of music. They were more into glamrock there. So what happened was a show was set up by a local radio station. It was me singing and Guitar Pete's band, Axe Attack, playing. After the show, about two weeks later, I had a call from Paramount Pictures. It appeared as though there was a director in the audience named Adrian who had done "Nine And A Half Weeks" and "Flashdance" and all these movies. And he saw my show. He had called up and asked if we would be available, he was shooting a movie and he wanted to use me in the movie. It was really strange, ya know, out of nowhere. The first show and here it is, a contact like that. It was like it really blew

my head, ya know? But what had happened, it never came through. Just the fact that the guy had called me. This guy was a major director.

MM No Hollywood Beast?

It burned me up for awhile. I figured, ya know, this guy, ya know... at least this guy had the forsight to say, "Wow, this guy puts on some funny shit." I'm a ball-breaker up there. I like to bust chops... and the show is real fun. A big maniac guy, like me, up there dancin' around and goin' hairy. Ya know, this guy probably never saw anything like that. We sent him the album, tee shirts, and a bio, the whole bit. So I figure, "If not this time, maybe next." We did a couple of shows...did you ever hear of a tatoo artist named "Spider Web"?

MM No.

B Well, he is a pretty infamous tatoo artist. He set up these crazy shows in New York. And he had like these little midgets & porno stars and a Elvis impersonator. We put on a couple of these shows that were a lot of fun. It was different. This was like fun, a freakin' circus on stage! I'm doin' a little something different instead of the usual crap.

MM When you played with Pete's band, who's songs did you play?

B Just my stuff. They were backin'

MM You didn't really have a ...

Right, I didn't really have a band. People were afraid to play with me. Here, it's a little different, ya know, Long Island doesn't really have a lot of hardcore or Basically, you got your Spandex, rock and roll, cover, copy bands and a couple bands that have been plugin' away for years tryin' to make it. I come out of nowhere and everyone's "Who the fuck is the Beast?" Bla, bla, bla. Tryin' to Continued on page 17.



MM Is "The Ultra-Violence" Death Angel's very first release?

AG Yea, it's our first L.P. on vinyl. We had a demo. We put out a demo in '84. It was produced by Kirk Hammett. That did real good and we were selling a lot of those but then, after awhile, we just sent it to different companies and stuff. And then finally, Enigma picked it up. It's comin' together real good. It's cool.

MM What's up now?

AG We're gonna do a U.S. tour in the summer. (it's over) We're also gonna play in some like, metal-fest in like, Texas or Arizona... somewhere, somewhere around there.

MM What's this about Death Angel

on MTV?

AG Oh, we just shot some stuff. We walked around the city and stuff, did some footage. Some skate shots and stuff.

MM Did you shoot a video too?

AG Ya, we did some live stuff and backstage footage and stuff like that. It turned out cool though. It should be airing shortly. (it probably already has) Things are happenin' now. Now all we have to do is wait. It should be happenin'. We have a studio now too.

MM Really?

AG Yea, it's pretty cool. It's small but it's all we could afford right now. It's a place to practice though.

MM You said your demo came out in

'84, right?

AG Yea.

MM Did you guys have a chance to play with bands like Slayer and Metallica in their earlier

days?

AG We played all those shows. Like Slayer would come and we would play with them. By now we've played with Slayer about six times. We would open for Exodus We did the "Show No a lot. Mercy" tour, then "Hell Awaits" but we didn't get the new thing. We played with Metallica on "Ride The Lightning" tour. The first time we met Metallica was during the "Kill'em All" days. We got in this show for free.We were talkin' to 'em and that's when we just started listening to 'em and that's when, like basically, our music changed some. We went for the thrash edge. Before our music was "crunchie metal". The music was slow stuff, now it's fast stuff.

MM Was it like Trouble's style of music? (as far as speed)

AG Yea, more Black Sabbath influence and shit.

MM Good job on "The Ultra-Violence". It's an excellent piece of mayhem.

AG We've been playing for six years. We went in there, just laid down the tracks. Shit. We like jamin' so much. It's fun. Just makin' new tunes and stuff. We're workin' on the new album, new songs, and shit.



MM Anything else?

AG Just for the record, I.P.F.S. lives!

PRIME EVIL (DEMO) By Jeff VanderClute

This IS the best demo I have reviewed so far for this issue. (I didn't review the Watchtower demo, otherwise, that would have been the best!) I have weaknesses for both speed and heaviness... I have a weakness for Prime Evil. Somebody give this band a contract. I would kill to hear a piece of Prime Evil vinyl. In the spirit of today's best death/speed bands, these guys are heavy, heavy as fuck! Andy's voice is pure death. He screams from the grave. The leads on this demo rip. They remind Slayer's chaotic solos. Slayer, "Look out, here comes Prime Evil!" The first track is "Random Violence"...it's total vocal mayhem. One of the most kick-ass intros I've heard in awhile starts the third song, "Living In Fear". (Over two minutes of pure metallic violence before the dood even spits out a single word!) The song "Prime Evil" is filled with crazed leads. It's great! The other track on the demo is "Kill For Me". My favorite track on the demo is all of 'em! If you prefer technical stuff, talented vocals, beautiful harmon-. ies, happy guitars, or ultra-talent, then stay away from Prime Evil. If bands like Slayer, Possessed, and Destruction turn your stomach, then stay away from Prime Evil. Not that

Mystic Force is talented, well produced, progressive, heavy metal. The production on this demo is really good. The two guitarists in this band really move. They sound GREAT! The vocalist is quite good, he reminds me of Geoff Tate a little bit. He's not a clone, just sounds a bit like him. When I listened to this demo, I couldn't get too excited. I was always concentrating on something else while it was playing. I knew it was good shit but I didn't know what to say about it. So one day I said, "Fuck it, I'm going to listen to this damn tape and that's all I'm gonna do!" So I played it three times in a row at maximum volume.My conclusions? A damn good band! As I said before, the vocalist and both guitarists are GREAT. Bobby Hicks has a good voice and it works well with Mystic Forces' style. This tape is one of the better produced demos I've heard lately. You'll like Mystic Force if you prefer talent to noise, want something a little different, or just like good solid heavy metal, progressive heavy metal. This band is not cheap, check'em out. If you're into nothing but the speed/death stuff (and there is NOTHING wrong with that!), then you probably will not get to excited over this tape. But if you like progressive bands like Wathtower and Fates Warning, Mystic Force should be checked out. They rule! 
MM Ya.

MM Coolness.



MM I guess "The Plague" is considered a mini-album, right?





GH Well, I was too! Jim, the guitarist, was pretty much taking care of all that-getting him back in the band. We all did once he got started getting back in. Don and Jim kept in contact when we got back off the road. Drabos seemed to want to stay but I don't think he was quite able to financially. He had a job and such. With this sort of thing, we were not really making enough to survive yet. So, he had some bills he had to pay. Drabos kind of said, "Guys, I don't know if

I'll be able to stay or not so whatever happens, happens." And that's the way we went into the tour anyway. Ya know, he said, "I will do the tour with you but I can't speak for afterwards. Let's talk about what's gonna go on when we get home." We got home and then Don just ended up coming back. So a, things are workin' out really fine.

MM Do you think Jim Drabos is

through with music?

GH No, he has got his own band, Death Force. They're pretty rippin'. Keep your eyes open for them.

MM Does Death Force have a label? (as of this interview in early

GH We finally found our "nitch" with "Darness Descends". It is finally what Dark Angel has been striving to achieve. And now we know what we want and we are going to turn the hell on! Ya know? MM And so it is. "Pure hell music" is what you plan to blow the walls of the studio apart with.

GH Ya, but before we go into the studio (they have been there by now), we want to make sure everything is solid bone-tight. Make sure there is every riff we want, ya know? Combat is being really cool about everything and they are big fans of "Darkness Descends".Fortunately for us, they've really supported us. As big as Combat is, they could say to us, "Look, time to go into the studio. Don't give us any crap, just get in there and do it." 
MM Rip'em up!

Trouble and Watchtower are two of my favorite bands. Trouble, I think, is the heaviest band in the world. Do you have the early Trouble tape?

MM No, but I've heard it rules! GH It's God. That's a God tape!

MM Do you have it?

GH Yea, I have a "goopy" it. I think Jim has it right now. It's great. It's a killer tape. It came out a year and a half before the album did. It came out in February '83. GH Some of my favorite thrash bands are now very label concious. I've read interviews with some of my favorite bands and they say stuff like, "Yea, we are definitely shooting for a major record deal."

MM Money tends to fuck things up and rearrange the priorities of

a lot of bands.

Man, for awhile there we were thinkin', "Man, we've got chance to be on a major. What are we gonna do?" We said, "Fuck it!" We've been looked at by some major labels, ya know, that's a fact. Nothing really serious. Nothing more than just talk.Ya know, "Hey, guys, keep in touch." # FLAMING

### BY MIKE LISTMAN



Bang your head! Fuckers! I hope that quelches the idea that I'm not metal enough. Well anyway, I'll get into the use of effects. This issue I'll explain digital delays. The least expensive and most common are the foot pedal units like those made by Boss. Although versitility is comprimised, they are an inexpensive way to go digital. They are priced from \$150 to \$250.

The three basic controls are "delay time", "feedback" (regeneration), and "delay level". Delay time controls the length of time from when the original signal enters the delay until the delayed signal leaves. This is variable from 0 milliseconds to 300 or 500 milliseconds and up to 16 seconds in costlier rack modules.

Feedback controls how many times the delayed signal is feed back into the input, giving multiple delays. Too much of this control will cause the vicious audio circle known as feedback. Delay level can control one of two things, the volume of the delay signal alone, or the relation of clean signal to dry.

In rack mount modules, the most common added feature is modulation. With this, you can create chorus, flange, and phase effects. These units range in price from \$250 to \$16,000.

Modulation has two basic controls, speed and depth (width). Depth is the amount the delay signal's pitch is bent. The more control, the more out of tune the delayed signal is from the original. The delayed signal is bent up and down alternatively and the speed knob controls this. Next issue, I'll give you different settings you can use. I'll also give you some examples of them. Till then, "Up The Hammers!" ML

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


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
